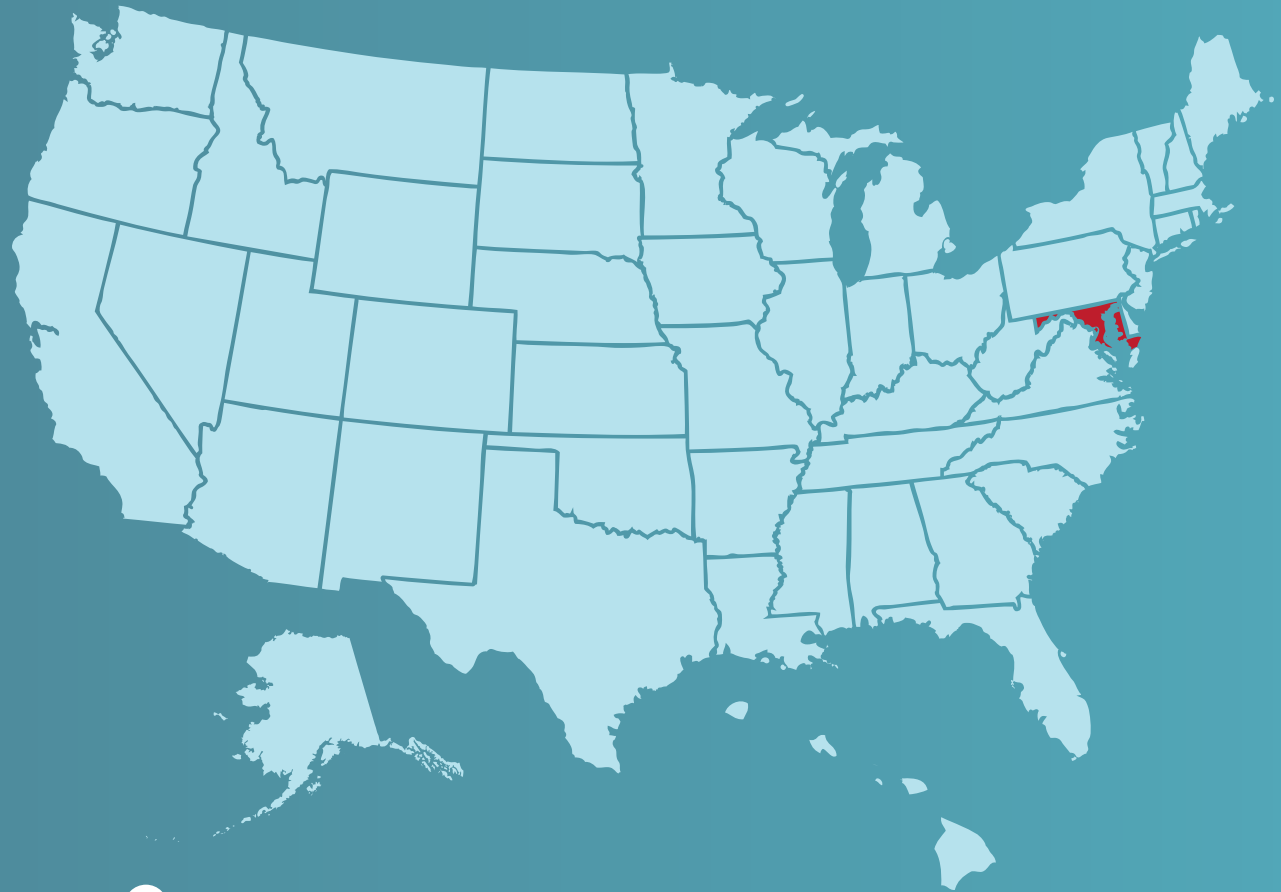
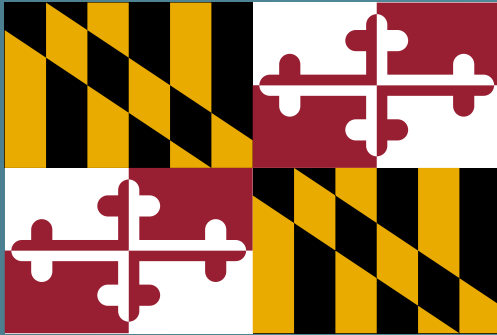

LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN


Dear Fellow Conservatives,

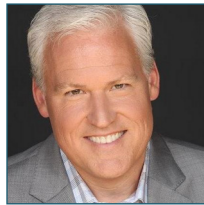

HOW WE SELECTED THE VOTES

As the nation's oldest grassroots conservative organization, the American Conservative Union serves as an umbrella organization for conservatives in America.

The ACU tracks a wide range of issues before Congress and State Legislatures to determine which issues and votes serve as a clear litmus test separating those representatives who defend liberty and liberal members who have turned their backs on our founding principles – constitutionally limited government, individual liberty, free markets, a strong national defense and traditional values.

As a result, the ACU Ratings have included a wide variety of issues covering votes on taxes, wasteful government spending, cultural issues, defense and foreign policy.

The votes selected by the ACU are not always considered the “most important” votes as defined by others, instead the votes selected are chosen to create a clear ideological distinction among those casting them.

MARYLAND SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **SB 1051 Government Subsidies.** This bill would have continued the refundable film production tax credit at \$11 million per year. ACU opposes taxpayer subsidies to already profitable enterprises and opposed this bill. The bill passed the Senate on March 12, 2014 by a vote of 45-1.

2. **SB 232 Prevailing Wage.** This bill requires state contractors to pay the “prevailing wage” on school construction projects. ACU opposes these laws that create an artificial wage rate above the market rate and drive up the cost to taxpayers. The Senate passed the bill on March 13, 2014 by a vote of 32-15.

3. **HB 739 Death Tax.** This bill raises the state exemption from the death tax to \$5.3 million from \$1 million. ACU opposes this tax and supports complete repeal but supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed the bill on March 15, 2014 by a vote of 36-10.

4. **SB 212 Transgender Discrimination.** This bill prohibits discrimination in public accommodations, including bathrooms, based on gender identity. ACU opposes these sweeping government mandates that do not respect custom or religious objections and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 22, 2014 by a vote of 32-15.

5. **HB 295 Minimum Wage.** This bill raises the minimum wage to \$10.10 an hour by 2018. ACU opposes creating artificial wages above the market rate that costs jobs among those who need them most such as inexperienced workers and students and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 27, 2014.

6. **SB 232 Education.** This bill increases funding for prekindergarten classes in Maryland for those under a certain income level. ACU opposes public schools that are restricted by income level and questions the necessity for public schooling for 4 year olds and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 27, 2014 by a vote of 46-1.

7. **HB 359 Government Regulation.** This bill prohibits the sale of beverages with an alcoholic content of over 95 percent. ACU opposes this government overregulation and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on March 27, 2014 by a vote of 38-8.

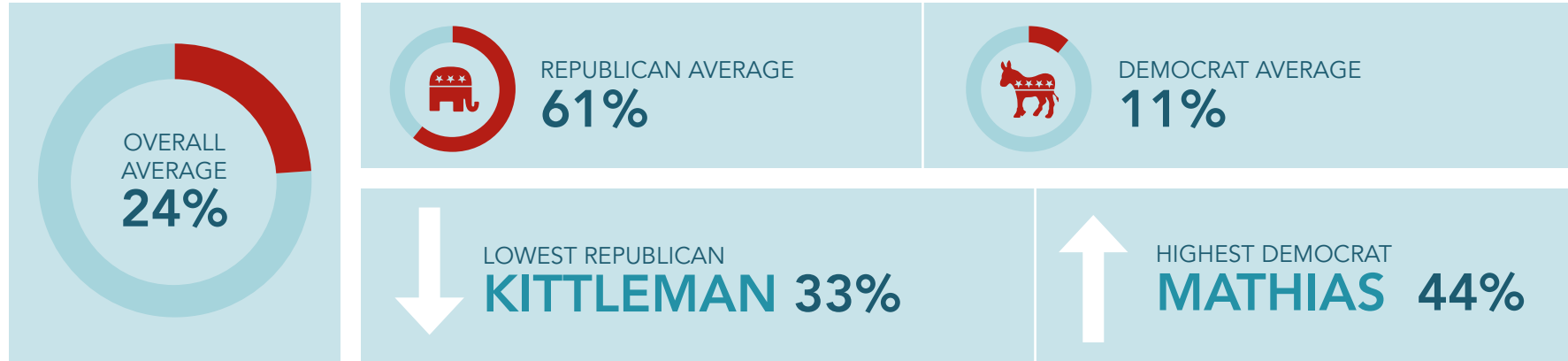
8. **SB 172 Budget.** This bill increased spending by \$9.5 billion following a series of large tax increases. ACU opposes this massive expansion of government and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 29, 2014 by a vote of 41-6.

9. **HB 1349 Affirmative Action.** This bill sets up an affirmative action program for the Maryland State Police that sets up a program to “advertise to minorities” and report on how they are “increasing diversity” in the State Police. ACU opposes these race-based programs and opposed this bill. The senate passed the bill on March 29, 2014 by a vote of 40-6.

MARYLAND HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **HB 740 Government Subsidies.** This bill provides \$2 million in taxpayer funds for “emerging companies in cybersecurity” chosen by the government. ACU opposes these subsidy programs that pick winners and losers in the marketplace and opposed this bill. The bill passed the House on March 4, 2014 by a vote of 95-41.

2. **HB 739 Death Tax.** This bill raises the state exemption from the death tax to \$5.3 million from \$1 million. ACU opposes this tax and supports complete repeal but supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed the bill on March 7, 2014 by a vote of 119-14.

3. **HB 1349 Affirmative Action.** This bill sets up an affirmative action program for the Maryland State Police that sets up a program to “advertise to minorities” and report on how they are “increasing diversity” in the State Police. ACU opposes these race-based programs and opposed this bill. The bill passed the House on March 14, 2014 by a vote of 111-24.

4. **SB 212 Transgender Discrimination.** This amendment by Delegate Szeliga to a transgender discrimination bill would have exempted bathrooms from the bill’s mandates. ACU opposes these types of mandates that violate privacy and do not respect custom or religious objections and supported this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on March 22, 2014 by a vote of 57-80.

5. **SB 232 Prevailing Wage.** This bill requires state contractors to pay the “prevailing wage” on school construction projects. ACU opposes these laws that create an artificial wage rate above the market rate and drive up the cost to taxpayers. The House passed the bill on March 27, 2014 by a vote of 92-43.

6. **SB 172 Budget.** This bill increased spending by \$9.5 billion following a series of large tax increases. ACU opposes this massive expansion of government and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 29, 2014 by a vote of 97-38.

7. **HB 359 Government Regulation.** This bill prohibits the sale of beverages with an alcoholic content of over 95 percent. ACU opposes this government overregulation and opposed this bill. The bill passed the House on March 30, 2014 by a vote of 97-32.

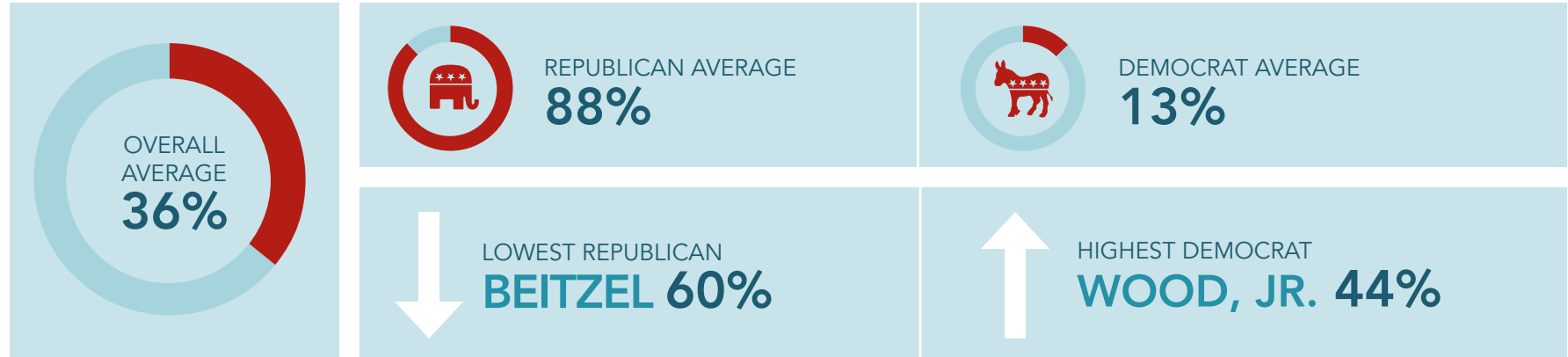
8. **HB 295 Minimum Wage.** This bill raises the minimum wage to \$10.10 an hour by 2018. ACU opposes creating artificial wages above the market rate that costs jobs among those who need them most such as inexperienced workers and students and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 31, 2014 by a vote of 84-47.

9. **SB 232 Education.** This bill increases funding for prekindergarten classes in Maryland for those under a certain income level. ACU opposes public schools that are restricted by income level and questions the necessity for public schooling for 4 year olds and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 3, 2014 by a vote of 103-35.

10. **SB 1051 Government Subsidies.** This bill would have more than doubled the refundable film production tax credit to \$18.5 million. ACU opposes taxpayer subsidies to already profitable enterprises and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 7, 2014 by a vote of 88-47.
