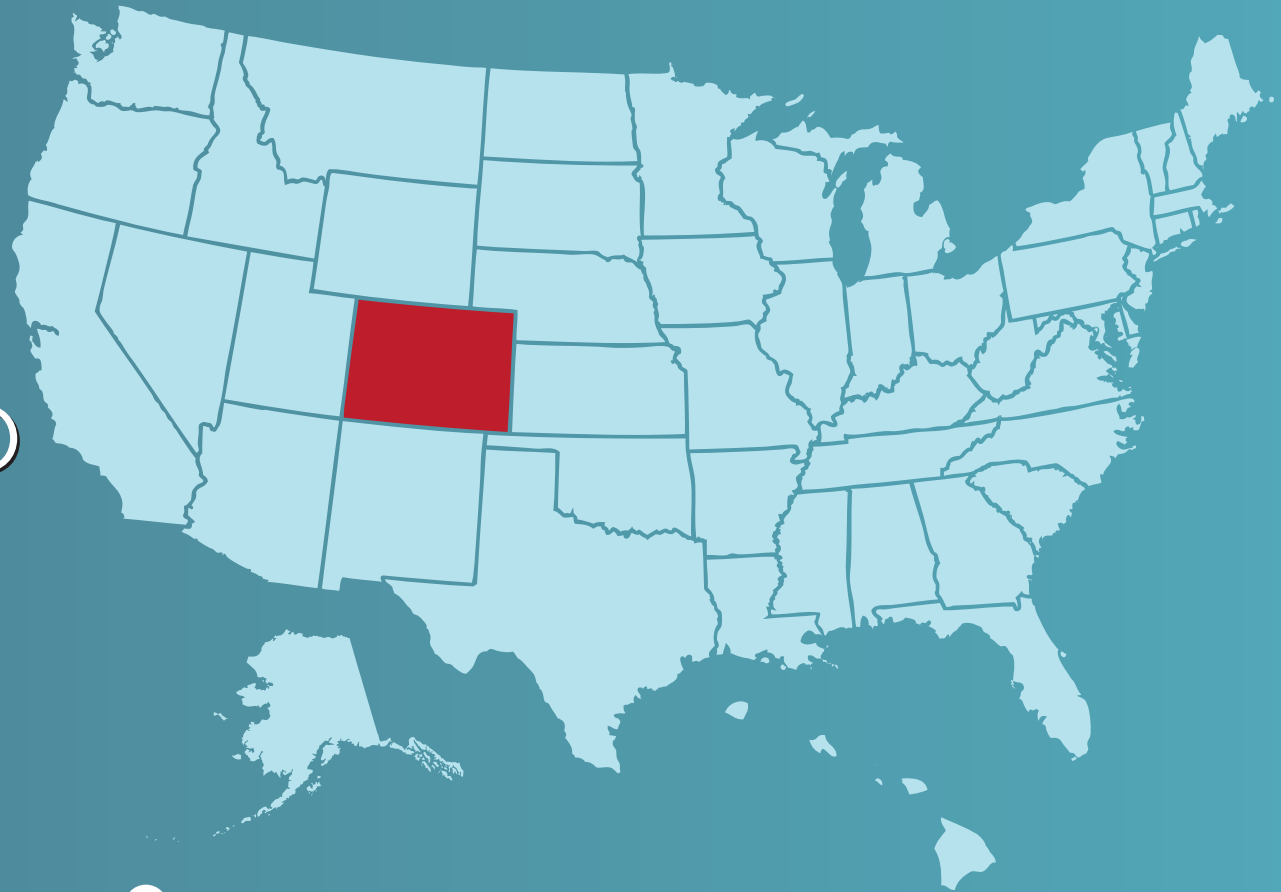

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LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Dear Fellow Conservatives,

I am pleased to present the American Conservative Union Foundation's ratings for the 2015 meeting of the Colorado General Assembly. Like our Congressional Ratings, our State Ratings reflect how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The Colorado legislators with the strongest scores voted most consistently with the ideals articulated in the US Constitution: limited and transparent government, individual rights, personal responsibility, and a healthy culture.

The 2014 election completed a political transformation that began in 2010 and resulted in voters of almost half the states, 23 in all, entrusting Republicans with the governorships as well as control of both chambers in the respective state, the biggest sweep since the first half of the 20th Century.

By examining all our State Ratings (which cover a wide variety of issues) we can see which states have best used their Republican majorities to apply conservative principles, how others have struggled, and in yet other states, how conservatives have stood up against liberal majorities. I know that this guide will provide you with the most comprehensive evaluative tool to learn how your legislators measure up.

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SELECTING THE VOTES

ACU researched and selected a range of bills before the Colorado General Assembly that determine a member’s adherence to conservative principles. We selected bills that focus on Ronald Reagan’s philosophy of the “three-legged stool”: 1) *fiscal and economic*: taxes, budgets, regulation, spending, healthcare, and property; 2) *social and cultural*: 2nd amendment, religion, life, welfare, and education; and 3) *government integrity*: voting, individual liberty, privacy, and transparency. These issues are designed to give citizens an accurate assessment that conveys which of Colorado’s elected leaders best defend the principles of a free society: Life, Liberty and Property.

COLORADO SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **SB 44 Renewable Energy Mandates.** This bill reduces the renewable energy mandate for investor owned utilities from 20% to 15% for the years 2015 through 2019 and from 30% to 15% for the years 2020 and thereafter. The requirement for electric co-ops by 2020 would be reduced from 20% to 15%. ACU opposes these mandates that drive up the cost of electricity for all and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 5, 2015 by a vote of 18-17.

2. **SB 77 Parental Rights.** This bill would establish a "Parent's Bill of Rights" that allows parents to decide on their child's participation in Sex Education or vaccinations and requiring parental consent to students' receiving counseling or medical services. ACU supports strengthening parental rights and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 12, 2015 by a vote of 18-16.

3. **SB 80 Pension Reform.** This bill would allow all new members of the Public Employees Retirement Association to choose a defined contribution pension system. Under current law, only state employees and a few community college employees have that option. ACU supports pension reform and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 17, 2015 by a vote of 18-17.

4. **SB 32 Concealed Carry.** This bill would allow Colorado residents to legally carry concealed weapons without a permit. The permit process would remain in place so Colorado residents could gain reciprocity in other states. ACU supports the expansion of Second Amendment rights and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 19, 2015 by a vote of 18-17.

5. **SB 93 Property Rights.** This bill provides for a claim of compensation for property owners if local governments lower the value of their property through limits on natural gas and oil extraction. ACU supports property rights and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 24, 2015 by a vote of 19-14.

6. **SB 106 License Requirements.** This bill reinstates regulations regarding hair stylists that had been eliminated in 2005. These regulations put small salons at risk. They include state license fees, over a thousand hours of course work and making it a "disciplinary offense to aid or abet an unlicensed hair stylist." ACU opposes these regulations that would cripple small businesses and are primarily designed to reduce free market competition and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 26, 2015 by a vote of 29-5.

7. **SB 175 Ammunition Regulation.** The bill repeals a 2013 law that banned magazines holding more than 15 rounds of ammunition. ACU opposes these restrictions on Second Amendment rights that primarily affect law-abiding citizens and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 17, 2015 by a vote of 21-13.

8. **SB 180 Regulation Enforcement.** This bill requires the state to issue warnings rather than fines to small businesses that are charged with first-time violations of rules that do not involve public safety. ACU supports reforms that help small businesses cope with the 1,500 pages of new regulations published each year in Colorado and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 17, 2015 by a vote of 20-14.

9. **SB 69 Tort Reform.** This bill eliminates punitive damage awards for lawsuits charging discrimination and disallows compensatory damages against companies with 15 or fewer employees. ACU supports these reforms of laws that are designed more to enhance attorneys' fees than to eliminate discrimination and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 24, 2015 by a vote of 19-16.

10. **SB 45 School Choice.** This bill offers a tax credit for families who choose to enroll their children in private schools or provide home schooling. ACU supports school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 25, 2015 by a vote of 18-17.

11. **SB 86 Private Firearm Sales.** This bill repeals the law passed in 2013 that requires background checks for the private sale of a firearm and makes it a crime to loan a rifle to a friend on a hunting trip or allowing someone to use your firearm on a shooting range. ACU opposes these violations of Second Amendment rights and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 25, 2015 by a vote of 18-17.

12. **SB 258 EPA Power Plant Mandates.** This bill would require legislative approval of any state plan to comply with EPA's new mandates on carbon emissions from power plants. ACU opposes these new mandates that will drive up electricity rates for those who can least afford it and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 23, 2015 by a vote of 21-14.

13. **SB 268 Rights of the Unborn.** This bill redefines the definition of a person when victimized by crimes. ACU supports the rights of the unborn and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 28, 2015 by a vote of 18-17.



14. **HB 1219 Refundable Tax Credits.** This bill would change a tax credit for renewable energy investments in enterprise zones into a “refundable” credit where the government would hand out checks for up to \$750,000 to participants. ACU opposes arbitrary tax credits especially when refundable and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 29, 2015 by a vote of 24-11.

15. **HB 1290 First Amendment Rights.** This bill would prohibit police from confiscating video from a citizen without a warrant or interfere with the lawful filming of a police encounter. ACU supports First Amendment rights and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 30, 2015 by a vote of 35-0.

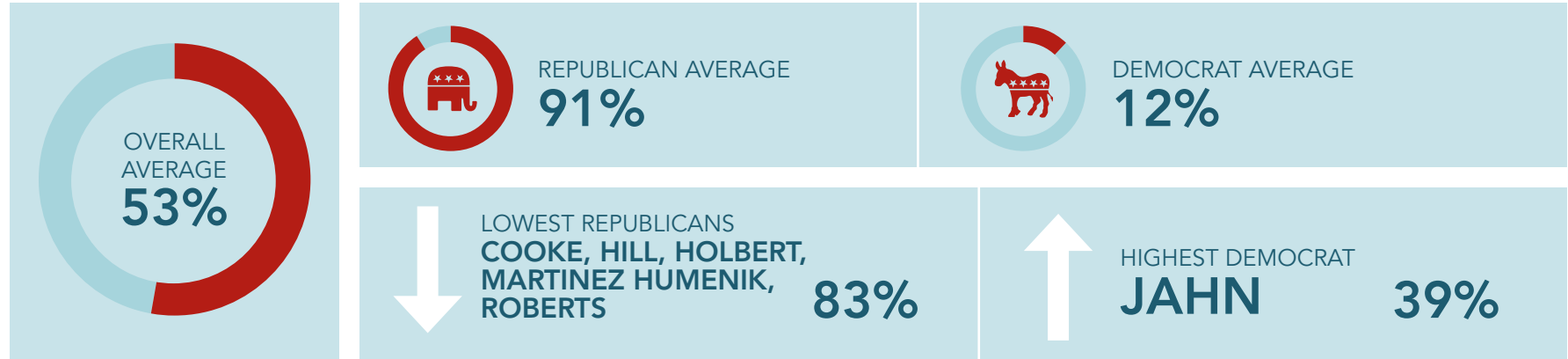
16. **SB 276 Traffic Cameras.** This bill restricts the use of traffic cameras to the enforcement of HOV lanes and tolls. ACU opposes the use of traffic cameras primarily designed to raise revenue rather than provide safer roads, but supports this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed the bill on May 1, 2015 by a vote of 22-13.

17. **HB 1057 Ballot Initiative Rules.** This bill would require that a fiscal impact statement be included in petitions to place initiatives on the ballot so that signers would know how much the initiative would cost the taxpayers. ACU supports government transparency and supported this bill. The Senate defeated the bill on May 6, 2015 by a vote of 17-18.

18. **HB 1226 Retail Food Establishment Fees.** This bill changes the fee setting process from a statute passed by the legislature to a state bureaucracy. ACU opposes changes that make government less accountable to the taxpayers and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 6, 2015 by a vote of 21-14.

COLORADO HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **SB 106 License Requirements.** This bill reinstates regulations regarding hair stylists that had been eliminated in 2005. These regulations put small salons at risk. They include state license fees, over a thousand hours of course work and making it a “disciplinary offense to aid or abet an unlicensed hair stylist.” ACU opposes these regulations that would cripple small businesses and are primarily designed to reduce free market competition and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 25, 2015 by a vote of 35-28.

2. **HCR 1001 Minimum Wage.** This bill would raise the minimum wage to \$12.50 per hour by 2020 and then automatically raise it each year without a vote of the legislature. ACU opposes these artificial wages that cost jobs among those who need them most such as students and inexperienced workers and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 31, 2015 by a vote of 33-31.

3. **HB 1132 Energy Efficiency Tax Credit.** This bill would create a new bureaucracy in the Colorado Energy Office to decide who will get tax credit certificates for energy efficiency in their homes. Under this program, government bureaucrats inspect the home to decide what level of credit the resident will get. ACU opposes these programs that give tax credits based on government favoritism and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 15, 2015 by a vote of 38-27.

4. **HB 1219 Refundable Tax Credits.** This bill would change a tax credit for renewable energy investments in enterprise zones into a “refundable” credit where the government would hand out checks for up to \$750,000 to participants. ACU opposes arbitrary tax credits especially when refundable and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 15, 2015 by a vote of 45-19.

5. **HB 1194 Free Contraception.** This bill would have provided \$5 million in tax money to give low income girls 14 years and older free contraceptive devices without their parents’ consent. ACU supports parental consent for programs affecting children’s health and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 20, 2015 by a vote of 37-26.

6. **HB 1290 First Amendment Rights.** This bill would prohibit police from confiscating video from a citizen without a warrant or interfere with the lawful filming of a police encounter. ACU supports First Amendment rights and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2015 by a vote of 47-16.

7. **HB 1226 Retail Food Establishment Fees.** This bill changes the fee setting process from a statute that passed the legislature to a state bureaucracy. ACU opposes changes that make government less accountable to the taxpayers and opposed this bill. The bill passed the House on April 27, 2015 by a vote of 38-26.

8. **HB 1346 Tax Increase.** This bill would force companies to add offshore income to domestic income when paying Colorado taxes. ACU opposes these anti-growth tax policies that would make Colorado less inviting for businesses and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 28, 2015 by a vote of 33-31.

9. **HB 1258 Paid Leave.** This bill would have imposed a tax on employees to fund a new bureaucracy that would be used to hand out money to those who take extended leave to care for their families. The program would apply to any business, no matter how small. ACU opposes this interference in the free market that is particularly harmful to small business and opposed this bill. The House defeated the bill on April 30, 2015 by a vote of 31-33.

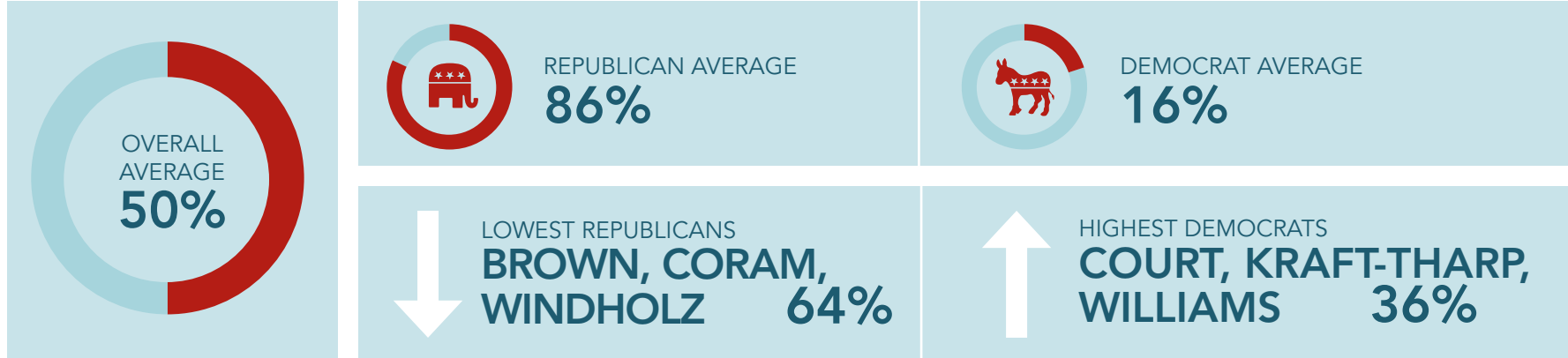
10. **HB 1057 Ballot Initiative Rules.** This bill would require that a fiscal impact statement be included in petitions to place initiatives on the ballot so that signers would know how much the initiative would cost the taxpayers. ACU supports government transparency and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 4, 2015 by a vote of 41-23.

11. **SB 276 Traffic Cameras.** This bill restricts the use of traffic cameras to the enforcement of HOV lanes and tolls. ACU opposes the use of traffic cameras primarily designed to raise revenue rather than provide safer roads, but supports this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed the bill on May 6, 2015 by a vote of 38-25.
