LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN


Dear Fellow Conservatives,

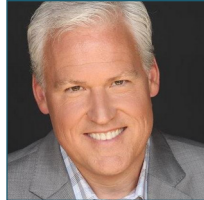

SELECTING THE VOTES

ACU researched and selected a range of bills before the Tennessee General Assembly that determine a member's adherence to conservative principles. We selected bills that focus on Ronald Reagan's philosophy of the "three-legged stool": 1) *fiscal and economic*: taxes, budgets, regulation, spending, healthcare, and property; 2) *social and cultural*: 2nd amendment, religion, life, welfare, and education; and 3) *government integrity*: voting, individual liberty, privacy, and transparency. TENNESSEE SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **SB 63 Federal Funding of Education.** This bill allows a local board of education to refuse federal funding without incurring a penalty, with some exceptions. ACU supports local control of education and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 26, 2015 by a vote of 28-3.

2. **SB 999 School Choice.** This bill creates a voucher system that could be used for private schools. Eligible students are those who attend schools with test scores in the bottom five percent and who qualify for free or reduced lunch programs. ACU supports school choice and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 30, 2015 by a vote of 23-9.

3. **SB 415 Government Accountability.** This bill requires volunteer fire departments receiving taxpayer funds to file an annual financial report with the state comptroller and any local government that provides funds. ACU supports government transparency that increases accountability to taxpayers and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 2, 2015 by a vote of 23-8.

4. **HB 745 Firearm Regulation Reform.** This bill creates a lifetime handgun carry permit with a one-time fee of \$500. ACU supports protecting our founder's belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 15, 2015 by a vote of 30-2.

5. **SB 1222 Abortion Waiting Period.** This bill requires a 48 hour waiting period on procuring an abortion and establishes requirements for informed consent. ACU considers abortion a human tragedy, supports efforts to educate patients before an abortion, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 15, 2015 by a vote of 27-5.

6. **SB 1280 Abortion Clinic Regulation.** This bill requires abortion clinics that perform more than 50 abortions per year to be licensed as an ambulatory surgical treatment center with hospital-style requirements. ACU considers abortion to be a human tragedy, supports requirements based on medical safety and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 15, 2015 by a vote of 28-4.

7. **SB 606 Longevity Pay.** This bill eliminates "longevity pay" for state executive branch employees hired after June 30, 2015. ACU opposes using taxpayer funds to pay people for being around a long time and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 16, 2015 by a vote of 26-3.

8. **SB 612 In-state Tuition.** This bill extends in-state tuition to illegal immigrants. ACU opposes giving these types of benefits to illegal immigrants (which is unfair to legal immigrants) and are benefits that will have to be paid for through higher tuition or increased taxes and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 16, 2015 by a vote of 21-12.

9. **HB 995 Firearm Carry Rules.** This bill allows permit holders to carry handguns in parks and public recreation areas with limited exceptions. ACU supports protecting our founder's belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 16, 2015 by a vote of 26-6.

10. **SB 27 School Choice.** This bill creates an Educational Savings Account for children with disabilities. It allows parents to withdraw their children from public school and receive an allowance of public funds for a variety of educational uses. ACU supports school choice for all and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed the bill on April 21, 2015 by a vote of 27-3.

11. **HB 1035 Common Core.** This bill cancels agreements between the state board of education and national organizations to implement Common Core. It requires the board to review and replace Common Core with a new set of standards. ACU supports local control of education and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 21, 2015 by a vote of 28-1.

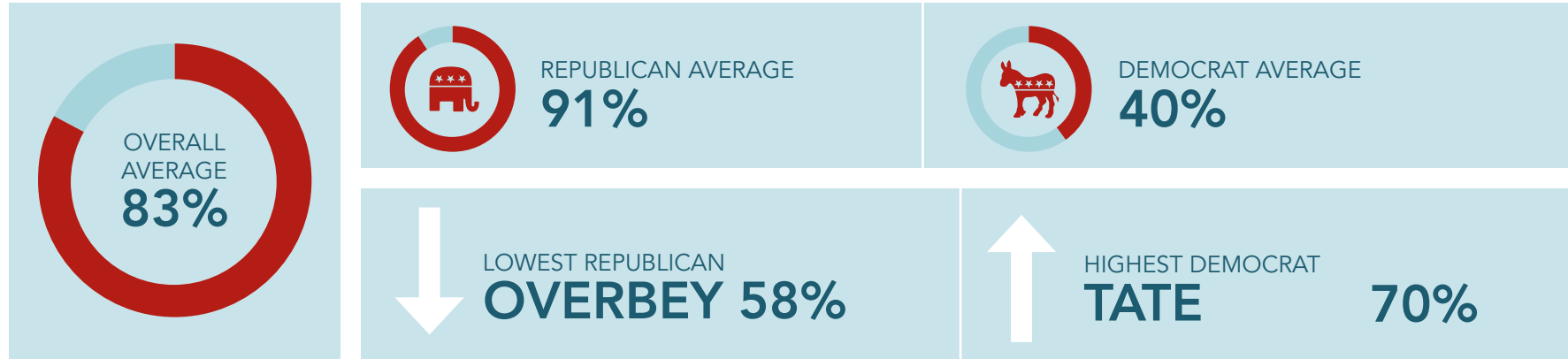
12. **HB 868 EPA Power Plant Rule.** This bill requires legislative approval of any plan submitted to the federal EPA to comply with its new power plant rule. ACU supports government accountability and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 22, 2015 by a vote of 29-0.

13. **SB 1128 Traffic Camera Restrictions.** This bill restricts the future use of traffic cameras to school zones. ACU opposes the use of traffic cameras that are primarily designed to increase revenue rather than enforce safety laws and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 22, 2015 by a vote of 29-1.

TENNESSEE HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **Fitzhugh Amendment to HB 108 Teacher Evaluations.** This bill phases in the use of individual student growth data in teacher evaluations. ACU supports the use of merit criteria for teachers and supported this bill. A key vote came on the Fitzhugh amendment to water down the bill. The House voted to table, or kill, this liberal amendment on March 26, 2015 by a vote of 60-33. A YES vote supports the ACU position to table the amendment.

2. **HB 995 Firearm Carry Rules.** This bill allows permit holders to carry handguns in parks and public recreation areas with limited exceptions. ACU supports protecting our founder's belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 30, 2015 by a vote of 65-21.

3. **SB 63 Federal Funding of Education.** This bill allows a local board of education to refuse federal funding without incurring a penalty, with some exceptions. ACU supports local control of education and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 6, 2015 by a vote of 68-22.

4. **HB 745 Firearm Regulation Reform.** This bill creates a lifetime handgun carry permit with a one-time fee of \$500. ACU supports protecting our founder's belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 13, 2015 by a vote of 90-3.

5. **SB 606 Longevity Pay.** This bill eliminates "longevity pay" for state executive branch employees hired after June 30, 2015. ACU opposes using taxpayer funds to pay people for being around a long time and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 20, 2015 by a vote of 70-26.

6. **HB 1035 Common Core.** This bill cancels agreements between the state board of education and national organizations to implement Common Core. It requires the board to review and replace Common Core with a new set of standards. ACU supports local control of education and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 20, 2015 by a vote of 97-0.

7. **SB 1222 Abortion Waiting Period.** This bill requires a 48 hour waiting period on procuring an abortion and establishes requirements for informed consent. ACU considers abortion a human tragedy, supports efforts to educate patients before an abortion, supports restrictions on the practice, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 21, 2015 by a vote of 79-18.

8. **SB 1280 Abortion Clinic Regulation.** This bill requires abortion clinics that perform more than 50 abortions per year to be licensed as an ambulatory surgical treatment center with hospital-style requirements. ACU considers abortion to be a human tragedy, supports requirements based on medical safety and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 21, 2015 by a vote of 80-17.

9. **SB 27 School Choice.** This bill creates an Educational Savings Account for children with disabilities. It allows parents to withdraw these children from public school and receive an allowance of public funds for a variety of educational uses. ACU supports school choice for all and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2015 by a vote of 52-43.

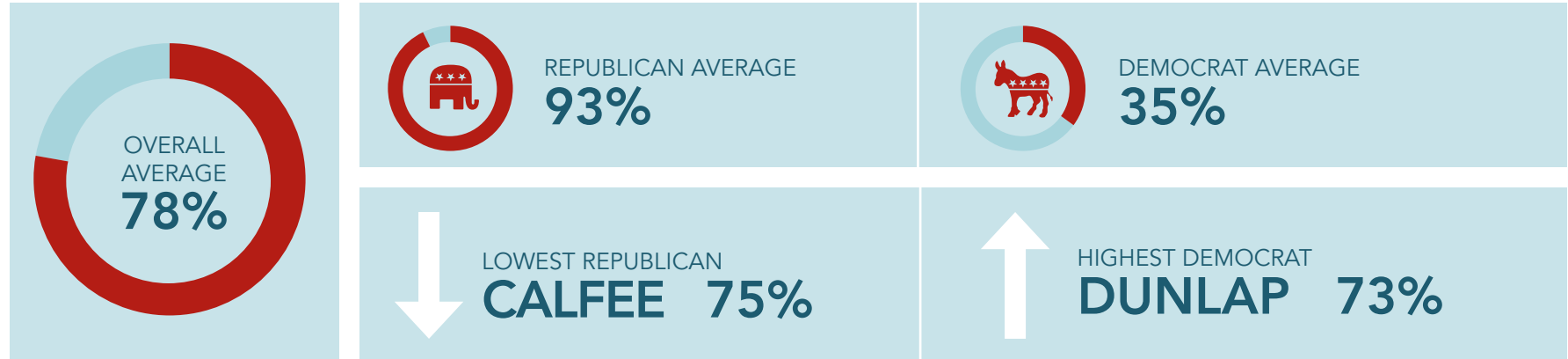

ACU opposes giving these types of benefits to illegal immigrants (which is unfair to legal immigrants) and will have to be paid for through higher tuition or increased taxes and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2015 by a vote of 49-47.

11. **HB 868 EPA Power Plant Rule.** This bill requires legislative approval of any plan submitted to the federal EPA to comply with its new power plant rule. ACU supports government accountability and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2015 by a vote of 96-0.

12. **SB 1128 Traffic Camera Restrictions.** This bill restricts the future use of traffic cameras to school zones. ACU opposes the use of traffic cameras that are primarily designed to increase revenue rather than enforce safety laws and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 22, 2015 by a vote of 74-16.
