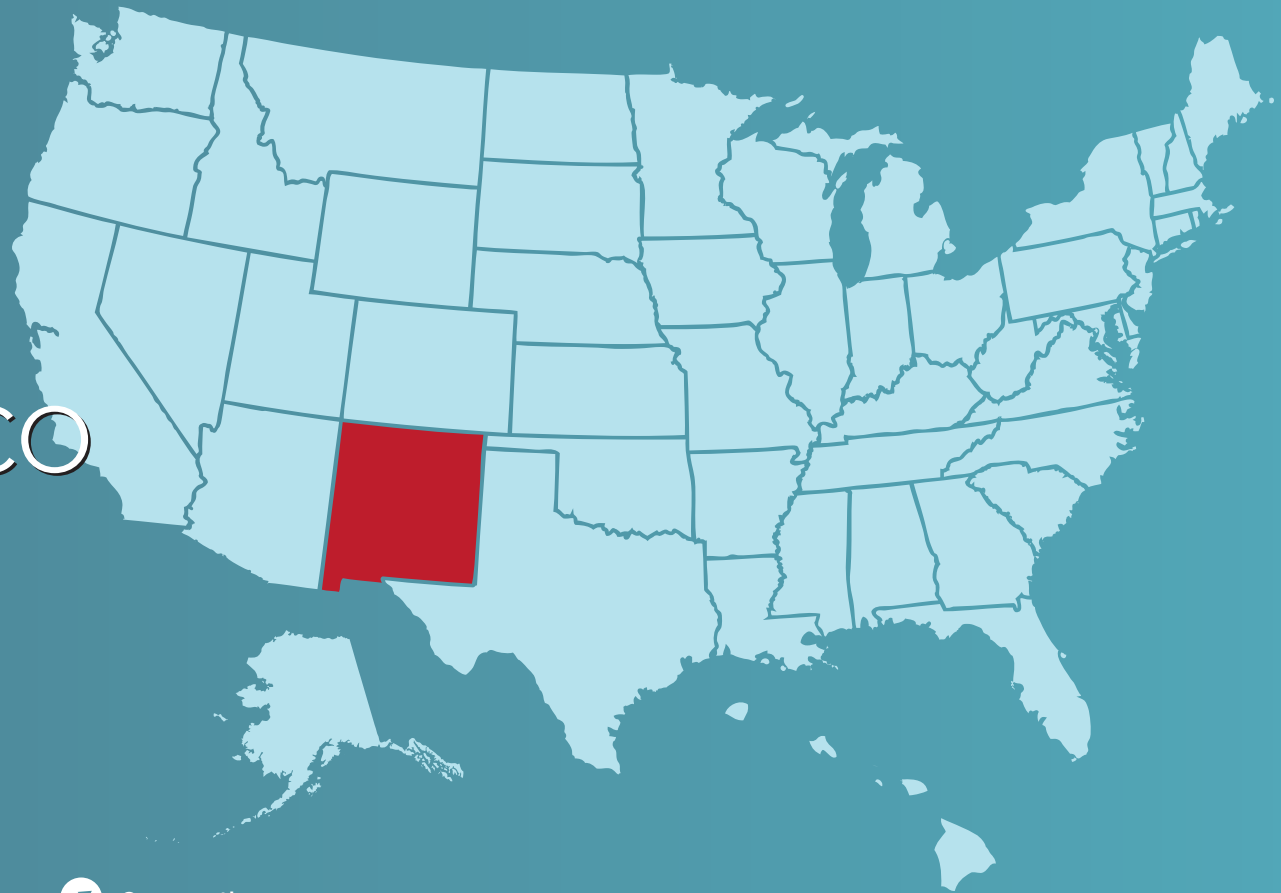

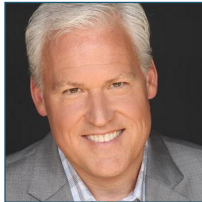

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SELECTING THE VOTES

ACU researched and selected a range of bills before the New Mexico Legislature that determine a member's adherence to conservative principles. We selected bills that focus on Ronald Reagan's philosophy of the "three-legged stool": 1) *fiscal and economic*: taxes, budgets, regulation, spending, healthcare, and property; 2) *social and cultural*: 2nd amendment, religion, life, welfare, and education; and 3) *government integrity*: voting, individual liberty, privacy, and transparency. This wide range of issues are designed to give citizens an accurate assessment that conveys which of New Mexico's elected leaders best defend the principles of a free society: Life, Liberty and Property.

NEW MEXICO SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **HB 72 Right to Farm.** This bill prevents nuisance lawsuits by those who purchase property near established farm operations and complain based on annoyances such as unpleasant odors or crop dusters. ACU Foundation's Center for 21st Century Property Rights engages heavily on this issue and supports private property rights and the right of farmers to operate their business and ACU supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 10, 2016 by a vote of 29-11.

2. **SJR 3 School Funding Mandates.** This resolution amends the state constitution to require an increase in state school spending. Increased government spending has a negative effect on both the public and private sectors of a community, which reduces family prosperity, as illustrated by the ACU Foundation's Family Prosperity Index. ACU opposes this fiscally irresponsible approach to government spending, which creates mandates that don't take into account need or state revenue, and opposed this resolution. The Senate passed the resolution on February 14, 2016 by a vote of 23-19.

3. **HB 139 Local Government Corporate Subsidies.** This bill expands the Local Economic Development Act to towns with under 35,000 people. It was originally proposed for towns of under 10,000 people. Under the bill, these towns can use local economic development funds to subsidize retail development. ACU opposes programs that favor one type of business over another and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 17, 2016 by a vote of 38-2.

4. **HB 270 Medical Malpractice Reform.** This bill gives liability protection to out-of-state doctors who give medical care to New Mexico citizens. ACU supports medical malpractice reform and supported this bill that helps those in eastern New Mexico who require treatment from doctors in Texas and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 17, 2016 by a vote of 40-0.

5. **SB 173 Interstate Mining Compact.** This bill allows New Mexico to join 22 other states in the Interstate Mining Compact, which promotes more state control over mining regulations. ACU supports our founders' belief in the 10th Amendment, supports efforts to reduce federal control over the states, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 17, 2016 by a vote of 27-10.

6. **HB 168 Ride Sharing Regulations.** This bill formally legalizes ride sharing in New Mexico and exempts ride sharing operators from the state's Motor Carrier Act, so they are not regulated as taxis. It also allows the drivers to be classified as contractors. Drivers will have to carry a \$1 million insurance policy. Expanding entrepreneurship promotes economic growth, which leads to greater family prosperity, as illustrated by the ACU Foundation's Family Prosperity Index. ACU supports a free market in ride sharing and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 18, 2016 by a vote of 33-5.

7. **HB 70 Hearing Aid Mandates.** This bill mandates that those authorized to dispense hearing aids in New Mexico discuss the availability of audio switch technology, known as telecoils. Further, the Board governing this industry will be required to develop written materials approved by the government. ACU opposes government mandates of this kind and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on February 18, 2016 by a vote of 29-9.

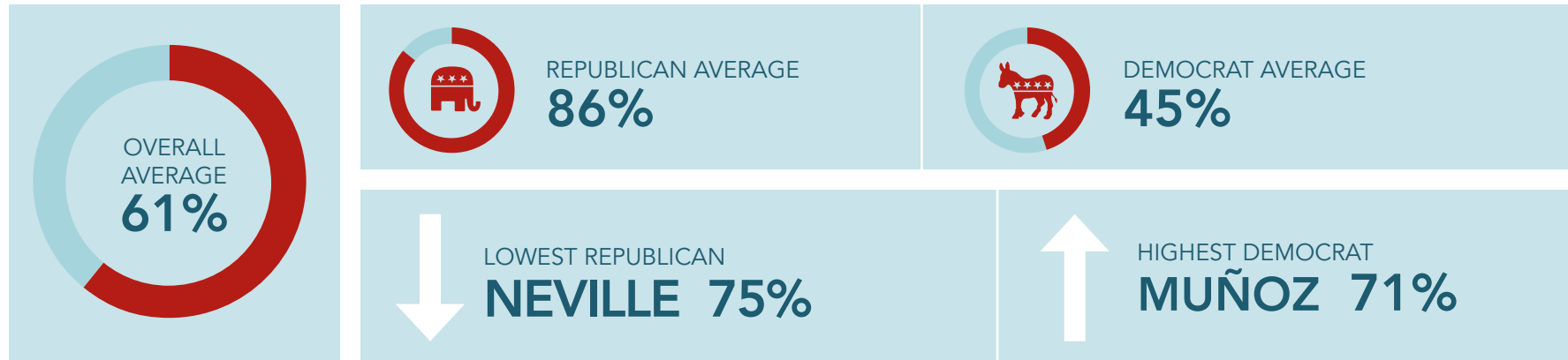
8. **SB 5 Delay of Tax Reduction (Special Session).** This bill delays the phased corporate tax reduction passed in 2013 by two years to reduce the budget shortfall. ACU opposes this anti-growth measure on the grounds that it is the wrong way to deal with the budget shortfall and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on September 30, 2016 by a vote of 21-20.

9. **SB 9 Budget Cuts (Special Session).** This bill makes a series of budget cuts to help make up for a budget shortfall. ACU supports this fiscally sound approach to eliminate deficits and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on September 30, 2016 by a vote of 42-0.

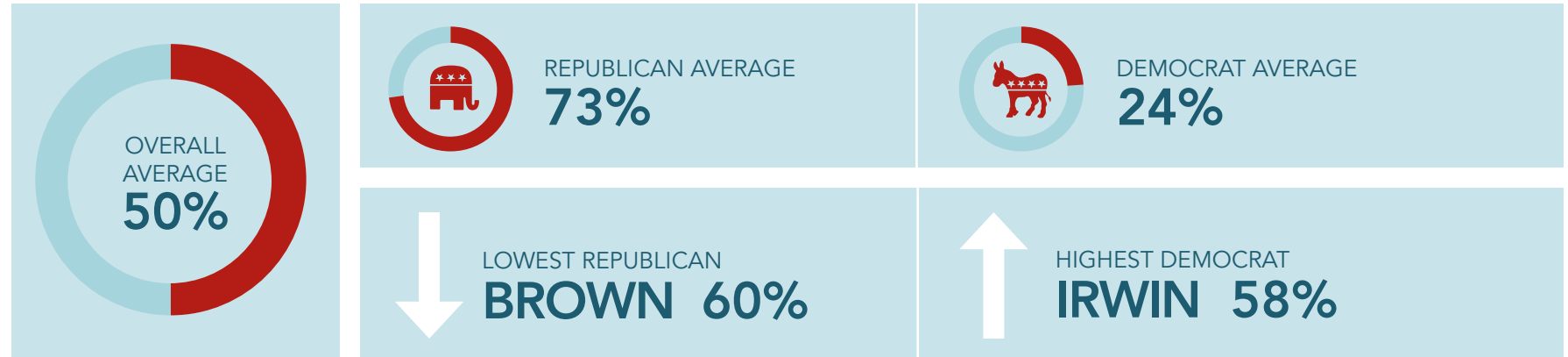
NEW MEXICO HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

1. **HB 99 Illegal Immigrant Drivers Licenses.** This bill eliminates the present system of giving drivers licenses to illegal immigrants and replaces it with a one year “driving privilege card” marked with their immigration status. ACU opposes special benefits for illegal immigrants and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed the bill on January 27, 2016 by a vote of 39-30.
2. **HB 200 Prevailing Wage Reform.** This bill eliminates “prevailing wage” requirements for road and school projects. ACU opposes laws that require every contractor to pay the same wage in a given area based on a standard set by a government bureaucracy, a standard that drives up the cost of projects to taxpayers, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 9, 2016 by a vote of 35-32.
3. **HJR 5 Ethics and Oversight Commission.** This resolution amends the state constitution to establish an independent ethics and oversight commission to field complaints about state officials and lobbyists. The amendment stipulates that complaints would be aired in public hearings and anonymous complaints would not be accepted. ACU supports strengthening taxpayer accountability in government and supported this amendment. The House passed the amendment on February 9, 2016 by a vote of 50-10.
4. **HB 194 Worker Compensation Reform.** This bill allows for the termination of worker compensation for employees when a worker engages in misconduct or is terminated for causes not related to the work injury. ACU supports worker compensation reform and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 9, 2016 by a vote of 36-27.
5. **HB 270 Medical Malpractice Reform.** This bill gives liability protection to out-of-state doctors who give medical care to New Mexico citizens. ACU supports medical malpractice reform and supported this bill that helps those in eastern New Mexico who require treatment from doctors in Texas and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 9, 2016 by a vote of 34-27.
6. **HB 139 Local Government Corporate Subsidies.** This bill expands the Local Economic Development Act to towns with under 35,000 people. It was originally proposed for towns of under 10,000 people. Under the bill these towns can use local economic development funds to subsidize retail development. ACU opposes programs that favor one type of business over another and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 10, 2016 by a vote of 65-1.
7. **HB 70 Hearing Aid Mandates.** This bill mandates that those authorized to dispense hearing aids in New Mexico discuss the availability of audio switch technology, known as telecoils. Further, the Board governing this industry will be required to develop written materials approved by the government. ACU opposes government mandates of this kind and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 12, 2016 by a vote of 59-0 but it was vetoed by the Governor.
8. **HB 72 Right to Farm.** This bill prevents nuisance lawsuits by those who purchase property near established farm operations and complain based on annoyances such as unpleasant odors or crop dusters. ACU Foundation's Center for 21st Century Property Rights engages heavily on this issue and supports private property rights and the right of farmers to operate their business and ACU supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 13, 2016 by a vote of 39-29.
9. **HB 166 Licensing Regulation.** This bill creates a new bureaucracy, the “New Mexico Home Inspectors Board,” that will charge a \$350 fee to license home inspectors. ACU opposes the proliferation of licenses and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on February 13, 2016 by a vote of 62-2.
10. **SB 173 Interstate Mining Compact.** This bill allows New Mexico to join 22 other states in the Interstate Mining Compact, which promotes more state control over mining regulations. ACU supports our founders' belief in the 10th Amendment, supports efforts to reduce federal control over the states, and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 17, 2016 by a vote of 51-13.
11. **HB 168 Ride Sharing Regulations.** This bill formally legalizes ride sharing in New Mexico and exempts ride sharing operations from the state's Motor Carrier Act, so they are not regulated as taxis. It also allows the drivers to be classified as contractors. Drivers will have to carry a \$1 million insurance policy. Expanding entrepreneurship promotes economic growth, which leads to greater family prosperity, as illustrated by the ACU Foundation's Family Prosperity Index. ACU supports a free market in ride sharing and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on February 18, 2016 by a vote of 63-4.
